## Stanley Jacobs Sworn In As Newest Board Member

New Orleans attorney Stanley J. Jacobs was sworn in today as the new Board of Regents member from the First Congressional District. Jacobs, an alumnus of Louisiana State University, is a partner at the Jacobs, Manuel and Kain law firm.

Jacobs served on the LSU Board of Supervisors from 1997 until March of this year. He is a past president of the Tiger Athletic Foundation. Jacobs is a member of the Tiger Athletic Advisory Board, the LSU Alumni Association, the National "L" Club, and the LSU Foundation. He is a past member of the Chancellor's Advisory Committee and the Athletic Council.

His appointment is effective May 15, 2003. We welcome him on board!

## Regents Honors Two For Service To Higher Education

Yesterday, during the Board's committee meetings, two men were recognized for their service to Louisiana postsecondary education. During the Technology Committee meeting, the Board of Regents presented the family of late Southeastern Louisiana University professor Dr. Fred Guillot with a plaque commemorating his service in the cause of technology education in Louisiana. Guillot, a long-time member of the statewide university Faculty Development Training Team, was lauded as a pioneer in technological innovation for the classroom.

Also, at the Facilities Committee meeting, the Board recognized the service of Southern University System Facilities Planning Director Larry McGhee, who will retire on June 30, after 35 years of service.

## Regents Endorse BESE/CERT Articulation Agreement

The Board of Regents today added its endorsement to an agreement between the Consortium for Education, Research, and Technology of North Louisiana (CERT) and the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education that will allow high school students who complete the BESE-approved Teacher Cadet program to use that high school course for credit toward an education degree at any participating CERT institution.

CERT is a twelve-member association of postsecondary institutions in North Louisiana. The Teacher Cadet program is a statewide, BESE-sponsored initiative to encourage high school students to become teachers.

### **Milton Womack Recognized For Cancer Prevention Effort**

Baton Rouge businessman Milton J. Womack was recognized by the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education and the Board of Regents today in recognition of his support of a skin cancer prevention program developed by The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center called Project Safety (Sun Awareness for Educating Today's Youth). The project which was developed by middle school science and health educators includes a teacher's guide and CD-ROM designed to provide accurate information about the consequences of overexposure to the sun and its role in the development of skin cancer.

Womack, who was represented at today's joint board meeting, by his son-in-law Stephen N. Carville, provided funding for the printing and distribution of the Project Safety materials for middle school science teachers throughout the state.

"We are most appreciative of the support which Mr. Womack has provided because of the potential it has to directly impact the health and welfare of thousands of children in Louisiana. Skin cancer is preventable. This education program is geared toward arming our students with the information they need to make healthy decisions," said Commissioner of Higher Education Joseph Savoie.

### **Regents Approve Endowed Professorship Funding Recommendations**

The Board of Regents approved \$2.6 million in matching funds for endowed professorships to 65 institutions. Seven of the 65 slots were awarded at random from a group of 13 eligible institutions.

Regent Pat Strong drew the names of the following institutions at random: Centenary College, LSU Health Sciences Center, Louisiana Tech, Loyola University, Our Lady of Holy Cross College, Tulane University and the University of New Orleans.

programs in social studies at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette;

- McNeese State University; Louisiana State University-Shreveport; Southeastern Louisiana University; and Loyola University;

- Grades PK-3 and Grades 7-12 Master Alternative Certification Programs at the University of Louisiana at Monroe;

- Grades 1-6, Grades 7-12, and Mild/Moderate Special Education Non-Master/Certification-Only Alternative Certification Programs at Louisiana State University-Shreveport;

- Grades PK-3, Grades 1-6, Grades 4-8, Grades 7-12 Undergraduate Programs at Dillard University; and

- Grades PK-3, Grades 1-6, Grades 4-8, and Grades 7-12 Non-Master/Certification-Only Programs at Northwestern State University, contingent upon the University addressing stipulations pertaining to the differentiation of grade levels within courses and the inclusion of content methodology for the areas of Science and Social Science.

In addition, the Board approved the awarding of Center for Innovative Teaching and Learning University-District subgrants to public and private universities throughout the state.
